Junior Ranger

- Children, adolescents and young adults from the surrounding area of the NP
- Aims:
 - Dissemination of the NP philosophy as well as promoting acceptance and integration of the NP in the region
 - Environmental education and experiencing nature
 - Cooperation with and support of the NP watch during management actions and other events
 - Education and training of adolescents to take over leading positions in the registered association, Junior Ranger e.V.' Bavarian Forest National Park
 - Working together with Junior Ranger Organisations from other protected areas on national and international level

How do we start?

Four Day Basic Programme

- First contact between kids and rangers
- Experience the NP and nature in a playful way
- Learn about main topics such as
 - large-scale protected areas
 - Forest ecosystems & characteristics
 - Species protection (lynx, capercaillie, fungi)
 - The NP area
 - Rangers
 - Process conservation
 - Landscape and cultural history
 - NP facilities

What happens after the Basic Programme?

- Kids interested in further activities can join the 'Junior Ranger e.V.', a registered association
- About once a month an activity with a ranger
 - Specific topics (water, lynx, capercaillie, waste etc.)
 - Inside or outside (hiking, building nesting boxes, creating a film etc.)
- Roughly divided into age groups



Junior Ranger 11-13 years

- Mentored by a ranger, about 1 meeting/month
- Basics of nature protection, protected areas and specific topics of the area





Junior Ranger 14-15 years

- Preparation for Volunteer Ranger Work
- Addressing important topics of the protected area



- The aim is to offer exciting activities throughout the programme to keep the kids engaged and build a team of about 40 to 50 active Volunteer Rangers
- Integration of young adults as volunteers into the work of the national park watch



Volunteer Ranger

- Supporting rangers with
 - Junior Ranger Programme
 - Guided tours for families and kids on specific topics
 - Big events
 - Presentation of the JR work at information stands
 - Information stands in general
 - Reserve patrols
 - Research projects
 - Media projects
- Intensive training on specific topics
 - Capercaillie
 - World Ranger Day
 - Nesting holes
 - Large carnivores

- About 15-20 active Volunteer Rangers at the moment
- Experience the whole JR programme
- Highly trained on nature and species conservation specific topics



Why the programme is so important

- Increased acceptance of the NP among the local population
- Kids learn about their environment and their protected area
- Kids' families get closer to the idea of nature protection
- NP gets ambassadors on local, national and international level
- We form the next decision makers
- NP gets highly trained and motivated volunteers in different fields: monitoring, visitor management, Junior Ranger Programme and so on....
- We might influence their career path
- We might keep young people in the rural regions

- Rangers can coordinate all these activities, because they are the face of the protected area
