- Hunting pressure (legal and illegal).
- Habitat modification and loss (e.g. from agriculture, development, forestry).
- Habitat fragmentation (such as roads, veterinary fences) that hinders physical and genetic dispersal and cause roadkills.

 Coexistence and predator ethology is being (re)studied and advanced


