Frank Nugent

Frank is a founding member and is the current honorary chair of IUF. He is a former Chair of the Mountaineering Council of Ireland (1997 to 2000) and has climbed in Ireland, Britain, the Alps, Pyrenees, Greenland, Himalayas and the Andes. He was deputy leader of the first successful Irish Everest Expedition (Stelfox1993) and a member of the crew of Northabout, when it sailed the Northwest Passage in 2001. Now retired, professionally Frank is an expert in occupational training, curriculum and assessment design.

Dr Mike Sweeney

Mike is a mining engineer, geologist and business man. He has spent most of his working life abroad (Africa, Asia, Europe). On returning home in 2006 he became a volunteer director with the Copper Coast Geopark, sits on the Co-ordination Group for European Geoparks and is on the Advisory Group to the Geological Survey of Ireland. Among his local interests is ownership of the Beach House Gallery which supports the work of over 100 Irish artists and craftspeople.

Frank Rennie

Frank Rennie is Professor of Sustainable Rural Development at the University of the Highlands and Islands in Scotland and is Assistant Principal (Research, enterprise, and development) at Lews Castle College UHI. He is the Programme Leader for the MSc in Sustainable Rural Development, and tutors mainly postgraduates and research students. His research interests lie in new approaches to online education and the benefits of ICT networking for sustainable rural development.

Brendan McGrath

Brendan is a planning consultant living in the Burren. He is author of "Landscape and Society in Contemporary Ireland" which was published by Cork University Press in 2013. Brendan has more than 30 years experience working as a planner in Ireland. Most of that time he has worked in Irish local planning authorities. He has also worked overseas in Africa and Papua New Guinea.

Sean Byrne

Lives in the Wicklow Mountains overlooking Lough Dan where he operates an 80 acre hill farm and a successful guesthouse specialising in walking holidays. He is also involved in road haulage and road passenger transport. Sean is a founding member of Wicklow Uplands Council and board member for over ten years.

Pat Dunne

Pat Dunne has been involved in the Wicklow Uplands Council since its formation and is now Vice-Chair. He is currently Chair of the Hill Committee of the Irish Farmers' Association. Pat's family have been sheep farming for generations and have a long and positive relationship with recreational users in the picturesque Glenmalure Valley, County Wicklow.

Dr David Scallan

David Scallan is a geographer with an interest in rural policy, ecology and recreational hunting. He received his PhD from NUI Galway in 2012. In a voluntary capacity, David is the Public Relations Officer for the National Association of Regional Game Councils (NARGC), which is the largest hunting and conservation nongovernmental organisation in Ireland. David has worked with a range of community groups, in particular, local gun clubs, state agencies and NGOs interested in upland management and the conservation of the Red Grouse.

Dr Mary Tubridy

Mary Tubridy is an ecologist and environmental consultant with a particular interest in sustainable rural development. She was the principal author of the Wicklow Uplands Study (1993) has been consultant to various EU funded projects on landscape and recreation She has recently completed a thesis on upland spatial planning.

Ruairí Ó Conchúir

Lives in the Burren County Clare. He has worked for the last twenty years in agricultural management, land reform, conservation and community based eco-tourism projects in Ireland and South Africa. He is an active hillwalker and mountaineer, is on the board of Mountaineering Ireland and has been chair of its access and conservation committee for many years.
