Purpose

Why is this group being formed

The NRL Parks Task Force is formed to support the work of the Nature Regional Landscape Parks of Europe and to strengthen the strategies and initiatives of the EUROPARC Federation Steering Committee and Directorate. Our purpose is to strengthen the knowledge and analysis about the contribution of NRL Parks on critical societal issues like climate change, regional development and conservation. The Task Force will increase the visibility of this category of parks and the positive contribution they make across Europe. The taskforce will also contribute to the work of the EUROPARC directorate in analysing the new and more integrated park policies developing across Europe. The task force will develop projects and find funding streams to further strengthen the work of the Task Force and the **EUROPARC** Federation.

- Establish two working groups. One on communication and one on climate change with two to four meetings a year.
- Share information on climate change adaption strategies in NRL Parks to form the basis for national strategies in at least 3 countries.
- Create the NRL Parks Climate Charter and gather all members to sign it at a relevant place and event.
- The development of one project proposal.
- Contribute jointly at the EUROPARC Conference in 2024 with knowledge and workshop facilitators.
- Collaborate with EUROPARC Sections with relevant information and activities.
